
From the Principal

Welcome to Issue 3 of our school newsletter for 2023. Newsletters are published fortnightly in even numbered weeks throughout the year and emailed to parents / carers using the Dept for Education EdSmart email communication tool. Reminder - Public holiday Monday and Pupil Free Day Tuesday

Don't forget that school will be closed for the Adelaide Cup public Holiday on Monday and for the Pupil Free day on Tuesday. OSHC is available for bookings on Tuesday only.

At the pupil free day teachers will be completing professional learning on a new suite of reading assessments that are being implemented across schools - DIBELS. DIBELS is an acronym which stands for Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills. DIBELS consists of 6 assessments designed to indicate whether students are 'on track' with the development of early reading skills or not. Where students are identified as not being 'on track' then the specific area of difficulty is identified so that we can provide support to assist with developing that aspect of learning. The DIBELS assessments are aligned with the elements of the Big 6 of Reading.

Numeracy Spot

Helping your child to develop Numeracy skills in the Junior Primary

Numeracy involves being able to understand how numbers work in everyday situations. We see and use numbers daily. When reading there are numbers on the page, our house has a number and when we buy something we add and subtract numbers. Help your child to develop a positive attitude towards numeracy. If you speak English as an Additional Language or Dialect, it's important to build numeracy skills in your home language as well.

An early skill that children develop is counting. Counting includes:

- saying and recalling numbers in the correct order
- matching number words to objects
- knowing that the last number counted represents the total number of objects.

Words to use:




- count forward, count backwards
- number before, number after
- more than, less than
- is the same as

In addition to counting, the ability to recognise a number of items without counting them is developed from an early age. An example of this is learning to recognise a pattern of dots such as on dominoes, dice and cards as numbers. This is called subitising.

Subitising is a term that was derived from the Latin adjective <u>subitus</u> (meaning "sudden") and captures a feeling of immediately knowing how many items lie within the visual scene, when the number of items present falls within the subitizing range.

Studies have found that most adults can subitise groups of items up to five. This is known as perceptual subitising. Beyond five, other mental strategies come into play for identifying the number of items in a group without counting them individually. These require some understanding of grouping and basic mathematics. For instance, when we see six dots on a die, we actually break this down into two groups of three which, when combined, gives us six. This is known as conceptual subitising and is an essential element for developing mathematical skills.

Initial selection is based on performance in the Australian Council for Education (ACER) Gifted and Talented Assessment


Year 6 students in 2023 are eligible to sit the test for a place in the Year 7 IGNITE program in 2024.
